

As America recognizes and memorializes the many events of the American Civil War of 1861-65, this 150th Anniversary Set offered exclusively to LCCA members -- with the Texas & General nameplates, unique finish, and special details -- may become the most coveted General locomotives ever created.

The Great Locomotive Chase or Andrews'
Raid was a military raid that occurred April 12,
1862, in northern Georgia during the American
Civil War. Volunteers from the Union Army
commandeered a train and took it northwards
toward Chattanooga, Tennessee, doing as much
damage as possible to the vital Western &
Atlantic Railroad (W&ARR) from Atlanta to
Chattanooga as they went.

James J. Andrews, a civilian scout and part-time spy, proposed a daring raid aimed at destroying the Western and Atlantic Railroad link to Chattanooga, thereby isolating the city from Atlanta. He recruited civilian William Hunter Campbell and 22 volunteer Union soldiers.

Finally, at milepost 116.3, north of Ringgold, Georgia, just a few miles from Chattanooga, with the locomotive out of fuel, Andrews' men abandoned the *General* and scattered. Andrews and all of his men were caught, including two who had arrived too late that morning to participate in the raid.

The group hijacked the *General* locomotive and a few rail cars while the train was parked for a breakfast stop for passengers. Along the way north, Andrews planned to stop and tear up track, sabotage switches, burn covered bridges, and send false telegraph messages.

The W&ARR conductor, William Allen Fuller, and two other men, chased the stolen train, first on foot, then by handcar, and later with other locomotives – the *Yonah*, the *William R. Smith*, and the *Texas*. As Andrews' party had cut the telegraph lines, all train crews, station masters, and W&ARR management to the north had no idea that the *General* had been captured by the enemy.

Andrews was tried in Chattanooga and found guilty. He was executed by hanging on June 7 in Atlanta. On June 18, seven others who had been transported to Knoxville and convicted as spies were returned to Atlanta and also hanged. Eight successfully escaped, traveled for hundreds of miles in pairs, and made it back safely to Union lines. The remaining six were exchanged as prisoners of war on March 17, 1863.

The pursuit of Andrews' Raiders formed the basis of the Buster Keaton silent film comedy "The General" of 1926 and a dramatic 1956 Walt Disney film, "The Great Locomotive Chase", starring Fess Parker as Andrews.

The 150th anniversary concept for recognition of these two locomotives of the Great Locomotive Chase was developed by the Lionel Collectors Club of America and produced exclusively for LCCA members by Lionel LLC.
